Promise, Pain, and Providence

Genesis 21:1-21

- 1. God is faithful to deliver on his promise.
 - a. God is faithful in his pronouncements.

Genesis 21:1a | 1 The Lord visited Sarah as he had said,

b. God is faithful in his promises.

Genesis 21:1b-2 | ^{1b} and the Lord did to Sarah as he had promised. ² And Sarah conceived and bore Abraham a son in his old age at the time of which God had spoken to him.

c. God is faithful in his provision.

Genesis 21:3-7 | ³ Abraham called the name of his son who was born to him, whom Sarah bore him, Isaac. ⁴ And Abraham circumcised his son Isaac when he was eight days old, as God had commanded him. ⁵ Abraham was a hundred years old when his son Isaac was born to him. ⁶ And Sarah said, "God has made laughter for me; everyone who hears will laugh over me." ⁷ And she said, "Who would have said to Abraham that Sarah would nurse children? Yet I have borne him a son in his old age."

- 2. But past sin still produces pain in our lives.
 - a. Isaac's persecution because of Ishmael.

Genesis 21:8-9 | ⁸ And the child grew and was weaned. And Abraham made a great feast on the day that Isaac was weaned. ⁹ But Sarah saw the son of Hagar the Egyptian, whom she had borne to Abraham, laughing.

b. Ishmael's prosecution because of Isaac.

Genesis 21:10-11| ¹⁰ So she said to Abraham, "Cast out this slave woman with her son, for the son of this slave woman shall not be heir with my son Isaac." ¹¹ And the thing was very displeasing to Abraham on account of his son.

3. Both promise and pain consist in divine providence.

a. Abraham's predicament.

His command:

Genesis 21:12 | ¹² But God said to Abraham, "Be not displeased because of the boy and because of your slave woman. Whatever Sarah says to you, do as she tells you, for through Isaac shall your offspring be named.

His comfort:

Genesis 21:13 | ¹³ And I will make a nation of the son of the slave woman also, because he is your offspring."

His consequence:

Genesis 21:14 | ¹⁴ So Abraham rose early in the morning and took bread and a skin of water and gave it to Hagar, putting it on her shoulder, along with the child, and sent her away. And she departed and wandered in the wilderness of Beersheba.

b. Hagar's petition.

Genesis 21:15-16 | ¹⁵ When the water in the skin was gone, she put the child under one of the bushes. ¹⁶ Then she went and sat down opposite him a good way off, about the distance of a bowshot, for she said, "Let me not look on the death of the child." And as she sat opposite him, she lifted up her voice and wept.

c. Hagar's promise.

Genesis 21:17-18 | ¹⁷ And God heard the voice of the boy, and the angel of God called to Hagar from heaven and said to her, "What troubles you, Hagar? Fear not, for God has heard the voice of the boy where he is. ¹⁸ Up! Lift up the boy, and hold him fast with your hand, for I will make him into a great nation."

d. Hagar's provision.

Genesis 21:19 | ¹⁹ Then God opened her eyes, and she saw a well of water. And she went and filled the skin with water and gave the boy a drink.

e. Ishmael's protection.

Genesis 21:20-21 | ²⁰ And God was with the boy, and he grew up. He lived in the wilderness and became an expert with the bow. ²¹ He lived in the wilderness of Paran, and his mother took a wife for him from the land of Egypt.
